Programs

Program Options That Help You Meet Your Goals, Your Way

Option 1: Combined Master of Nursing/Primary Health Care Nurse Practitioner Certificate (MN/PHCNP)

Students earn a Master's degree and PHCNP concurrently, preparing them to write the CNPE (NP-Primary Health Care Exam) and work as Nurse Practitioners

Option 2: Primary Health Care Nurse Practitioner Certificate (PHCNP)

Prepares professional nurses who hold a Master of Nursing (or equivalent) to write the CNPE (NP-Primary Health Care Exam) and work as Nurse Practitioners



Option 1: Combined MN/PHCNP

Students are required to successfully complete 11 course credits

- 4 Required Core MN Courses
- 7 PHCNP Certificate Required Courses
- ✓ Graduates receive both a MN degree and a Primary Health Care Nurse Practitioner Certificate

Time-to-completion Options


Option 1: Combined MN/PHCNP

Full-time students have a maximum of 6 terms or 2 years while part-time students have a maximum of 12 terms or 4 years

Option 2: PHCNP Certificate

Full-time enrolment only with a maximum of 9 terms or 3 years to complete all program requirements.





Toronto Metropolitan University Applying to the Program

Option 1 - Combined MN/PHCNP

Admission Requirements

- Bachelor's degree in Nursing (or equivalent) from a program accredited by CASN or approved by the appropriate provincial body
- Minimum overall B (3.00 CGPA or 70%) average in their undergraduate nursing program, with at least a B (3.00 GPA or 70%) in the final half or last 20 one-term/semester courses
- Minimum of two years of full-time nursing practice (3640 hours) within the past five years as a registered nurse by time of application
- Demonstrated capacity to succeed in a graduate program. It is expected that the candidate will have obtained good academic standing in non-nursing and nursing subjects
- Three Letters of Recommendation, one of which must be academic and one must be clinical



Option 2 - PHCNP Certificate

Admission Requirements

- Master's degree in Nursing (or equivalent) from a program accredited by CASN or approved by the appropriate provincial body
- Minimum overall B (3.00 CGPA or 70%) average in their undergraduate nursing program, with at least a B (3.00 GPA or 70%) in the final half or last 20 one-term/semester courses
- Minimum of two years of full-time nursing practice (3640 hours) within the past five years as a registered nurse by time of application
- Demonstrated capacity to succeed in a post-graduate program. It is expected that the candidate will have obtained good academic standing in non-nursing and nursing subjects
- Three Letters of Recommendation, one of which must be academic and one must be clinical



Application Details

- The First Consideration deadline date is January 19, 2024
 - All Required and Supplementary Supporting Documents (including Reference Letters) must be submitted by this date
- After January 19, 2024 applications will continue to be accepted to the program until it is full or admissions formally closes
- A non-refundable fee is payable to the Ontario Universities'
 Application Centre (OUAC) and must be submitted at the time of completing the online application

Describe how your professional experiences, scholarly activities and/or leadership activities have contributed to your readiness for either a course-based or thesis-based Masters in Nursing. This might include contributions to publications/presentations, committees/projects, professional awards and/or scholarships, or significant involvement in continuing education. Graduate education requires a significant commitment. Detail how you will balance your career (including work hours) and your studies to secure your success in the program.

- 2. What professional and personal attributes do you bring to the Nurse Practitioner in Primary Health Care role?
- 3. Given that each course requires at least 15 hours preparation time per week in addition to course and clinical placement hours (an additional 15-20 hours per week), what specific strategies will you use to meet the time demands of the program?

Written Submissions

- Your written submission contributes strongly toward determining whether you are selected for admission to the Primary Health Care Nurse Practitioner Program
- The assessment scores based on ability to address the questions in a comprehensive and personal manner
- Answers that are overly brief and very general will receive a low score





Letters of Recommendation

<u>Academic Recommendation</u> - One of the required references **MUST** be an Academic Letter of Recommendation (e.g., a professor who taught you during your previous degree and who can speak to your intellectual capabilities, capacity to engage in studies at a graduate level and leadership potential).

<u>Professional Recommendation</u> - The second Letter of Recommendation may be submitted by a professional (non-academic) referee. This reference should come from a supervisor who is familiar with your professional accomplishments (e.g., leadership, contribution to the profession, involvement in professional organizations).



Letters of Recommendation

<u>Clinical Practice Recommendation</u> - This letter of recommendation should come from an individual that is well acquainted with your nursing practice abilities, and would normally be your workplace healthcare manager or someone in a position to speak to your direct clinical experience.





Letters of Recommendation

Your referees should be able to speak to who you are and your abilities.

This can include:


- Your work in the community; community engagement; contributions as part of a team;
- Intellectual capabilities, work ethic, resilience and ability to overcome challenges, integrity, adaptability/ flexibility
- Capacity to engage in research or scholarship at a masters level, written communication skills,
- Leadership potential, critical thinking,
- Equity deserving groups How you might have overcome barriers to achieve success in your academic and professional life



Curriculum Vitae

Should include:

- Academic education (post-secondary degrees, diplomas, certificates)
- Continuing education (including workshops, professional development)
- Awards and honours
- Relevant presentations/publications/research
- Professional employment
- Current membership in professional organizations
- Committees (e.g., work related, professional)
- Relevant volunteer activities





Unofficial Transcripts

Unofficial Transcripts are required from each post-secondary institution attended. Applicants from Ontario Universities and Colleges will have the option of ordering their transcripts while completing the OUAC application form (only one order required). If you choose this option you are exempt from submitting electronic copies with your package.

Once an Offer of Admission is received and confirmed by the Applicant, the Applicant will be required to submit official transcripts.



Proof of Registration with the CNO

Applicants are required to provide proof of current registration or proof of registration eligibility with the College of Nurses of Ontario by submitting a Proof of Registration/Eligibility form with required documentation (a copy of their License Renewal Receipt with registration number visible)



Verification of Employment Hours

Candidates applying to the combined MN/PHCNP or PHCNP certificate program must provide evidence that they meet the nursing practice requirement of the equivalent of 2 years of full-time work (a minimum of 3,640 hours within the past 5 years) as a Registered Nurse. This is through the employer-completed Verification of Employment Hours form or Employment Hours forms from your HR department.



Submitting the Application

- Incomplete applications will not be considered for admission.
- Applicants who submit all required and supplemental documentation by January 19, 2024 will be given first consideration for admission.
- Because the number of applicants greatly exceeds the number of positions available, meeting our minimum admission requirement is not a guarantee of admission.

Funding

- ✓ TMU Graduate fellowship: Maximum \$12,000 each
 - available on a competitive basis to full-time MN/PHCNP students with an B+ or above average
- ✓ Graduate Departmental Awards: Maximum of \$4,000
 - distributed by the department on a merit basis and available to full-time combined MN/PHCNP students only
- ✓ Graduate Assistantships
- ✓ External Funding (OGS, CIHR, RNAO, etc.)
- ✓ OSAP for MN/PHCNP only



Fees

- ✓ Tuition for the MN/PHCNP and PHCNP programs is course-based
- ✓ Established annually (approximately \$1,500 per course plus ancillary fees)
- ✓ Tuition fees charged to full-time and part-time students is the same
- ✓ Between \$15,000-\$20,000 total
